Thoughts On...
Putting Mirrors

Musings on various aspects of golf.

I am not an expert in any aspect of golf, but I really caution you about asking me any thing about putting. You know the drill, you are out on the course having some problems with your putting that day, and in a moment of weakness you turn to one of your playing partners and ask if they see anything you might correct. If your group happens to include me, I suggest you resist that impuse.

During a recent round with Gary Emerson, who was forced to watch my repeated failures, Gary suggested I try out a golf mirror. Hey, why not? While my respect for training aids is somewhat tempered by the vision of Kevin Costner walking out of his trailer in Tin Cup with various implements hanging off his body, I decided to buy one. A golf mirror is a simple rectangular piece of plastic with a sheet of reflective mylar pasted on one side. It has a few holes and lines on it to assist you in securing it to the ground

and aligning your putting stroke. There is a little knock out on one side where you place your ball. I'm sure it costs about three cents to make, which may raise the question of its effectiveness, but when it comes to golf, I am willing to make any sacrifice.

"Nearly half the shots played, even by an expert golfer, are on the putting surface."

The primary idea behind this training aid is that by looking down at your mirrored reflection you can place your eyes directly over the ball, which may help in getting the ball started on the proper line, assuming of course, that your putting stroke is functional to start with. The problem with the mirror is it tends to contribute to a common affliction where golfers look down at that stationary white ball.... and lock up. Many of us grew up playing sports with moving balls, pucks,

Frisbees, and such, that when combined with moving quickly in the proximity of other humans, train us athletes to be great at reacting to movement. Unfortunately, that is not how golf works. Instead of reacting, you have to get youself started, to then get the ball moving too.

With this damn mirror, I am no longer just looking down at the ball, but also my growing nosehairs and blood shot eyes. On top of that, you are supposed to remain still and aligned, which after succumbing to the cause of those bloodshot eyes, virtually impossible. So now, with all of that additional unaccustomed visual input in mind, I am supposed to start my smooth takeaway. Like silk, right?

The next time you see me hesitating over a putt just a little to long, you will know that I have been training diligently with my putting mirror. Give one a try.



Some 2023 Rule Changes

Rule 3.3b (4) – Player not Responsible for Showing Handicap on Scorecard or Adding up Scores: The rule has been amended so that a player is no longer required to show their handicap on their scorecard, or calculate their net score. Now the responsibility of the Committee.

Rule 9.3 – Ball Moved By
Natural Forces: New
Exception 2 provides that a

ball must be replaced if it moves to another area of the course after being dropped, placed or replaced. This also applies if the ball comes to rest out of bounds. (Think Ricky Fowler drop that rolled back into lake)

Rule 11.1b – Ball in Motion
Accidentally Hits Person or
Outside Influence: Place
from Where Ball Must Be
Played: Rule has been
amended to provide that if a ball
played from the putting green
his an insect, the player, or the

club used to make the stroke, the ball is played as it lies – the stroke is not replayed.

Back-on-the-Line Relief Procedures - The back-onthe-line procedure is amended to provide that the player is required to drop on the line. The spot on the line where the ball first touches the ground when dropped creates a relief area that is one club-length in any direction from that point. (So not directly on line anymore)

RULES QUIZ

Question - A player may not ask to have another player's ball, which lies on the putting green, to be lifted under what circumstance per Rule 15.3 (Ball or Balll-Marker Helping or Interfering with Play)?

Answer – The ball is in position to interfere with the play of a third player.

Question – In stroke play, a player's tee shot carries 170 yards over a narrrow red penalty area into some trees. The ball is not found within three minutes and it could not be determined whether the ball bounced back into the penalty area, or came to rest in the trees and rough beyond it. The player dropped a ball under Rule 17.1d(3) and completed play of the hole. What is the ruling?

Answer – The player gets three penalty strokes under Rules 18.2a and 14.7 and must correct the error under Rule 14.7, or be disqualified.

NCGA INFO

Last fall, the NCGA terminated their score entry app, so if you haven't entered a score in a while, you now need to download the USGA app to do so. If you enter your score the same day as play, it contributes to the new daily course handicap adjustment (yes, you can get more or less strokes based on the scores entered on a given day).

BEST ROUND LATELY

Our November tournament, the Modified Ryder Cup, is played with three formats, Scramble, Aggregate Score, and Best Ball. The six holes played with the Aggregate Score format is usually the most daunting, and has dashed many hopes. Par for those holes is 48. The second flight team of Brian Dorn and Abraham Pena (how is Dorn ever in a second flight?) shot a combined score of 38, ten under par on holes seven through twelve. That's an average of 1.67 under on every hole. Next best score in the entire field on those holes was 45 (Alex Perez/Luis Garcia). Incredible play guys.
